Sifting this summer through family archives, my mother gave me this typed letter, written by the City of Bath Director of Education on 31st May 1963:

Dear Sir or Madam,

Allocation of pupils to secondary schools in September 1963

Exam No. 707 Name Blatchford Roy

The Schools Selection Board have considered the results of the Schools Selection Test, the recommendation of Head Teachers and, in certain cases, reports from the Interviewing Panels, as well as the expression of parents' wishes, and it is now possible to state that your son will be offered a place at the City of Bath Boys' School. The headmaster will wish to see him before he enters the school and will be getting in touch with you in due course.

Will you please let me know by <u>Thursday</u>, <u>6th June</u> at the latest whether or not you wish your son to take up this place.

I want to make it clear that when a boy is offered a place in a secondary grammar school, his parents are expected to leave him at school at least until the end of the school year in which he reaches his 16th birthday. Parents should also be prepared to consider allowing their son to continue his education at secondary grammar school up to the age of 18, if, in the opinion of the Head and Governors of the school, that is in his best interests.

Parents who are not prepared to give their son every encouragement to complete the grammar school course should not allow him to take up a place in a grammar school.
